

From Wm. H. Bass History Stories (Wm. Bass was a local lawyer)





Here's a photo & business card for Ella M. Sands (1882-1955), who was a dressmaker/tailoress in Northville. She was the mother of a son Arthur, and daughters Jessie, Elizabeth, Grayce, and Marcella. She worked out of her home, first in a house on South Main Street, then later the stucco house on Bridge Street, and finally at 211 South 2nd Street. She was a member of the Baptist Church in the village. Her picture was taken at a studio by a professional photographer, as was a common practice.(Sent in by Jack Sands, Ella's grandson.) before families owned their own cameras, and now picture phones.
