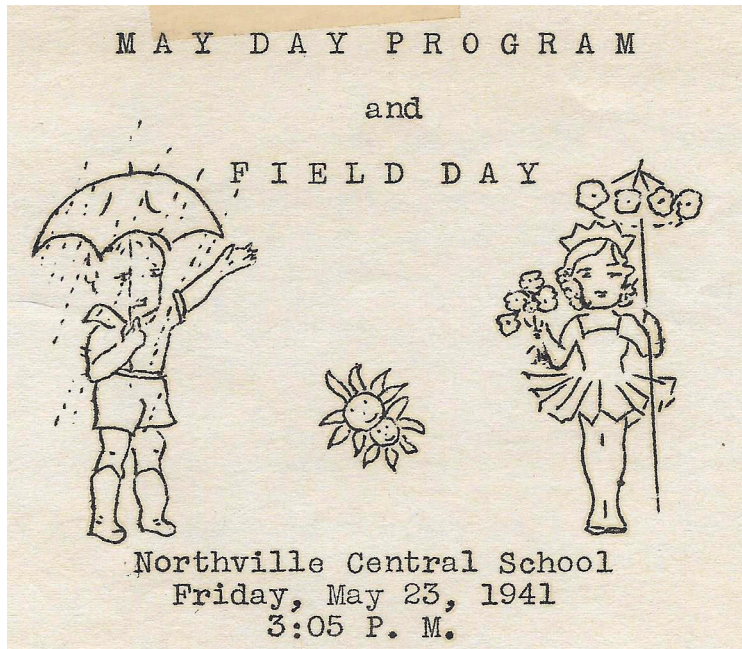

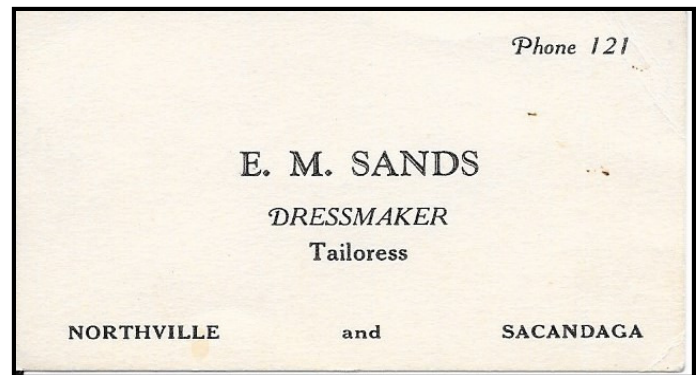
From Wm. H. Bass History Stories
(Wm. Bass was a local lawyer)

Jacob Van Arnam operated a store where the old Northville bank now stands. According to Mr. Bass, Jacob was the first merchant to introduce oysters in Northville. He also put in a supply of bananas but the towns people did not take kindly to them at the time and he had to wheel them away to the dump.

Here's a photo & business card for Ella M. Sands (1882-1955), who was a dressmaker/tailoress in Northville. She was the mother of a son Arthur, and daughters Jessie, Elizabeth, Grayce, and Marcella. She worked out of her home, first in a house on South Main Street, then later the stucco house on Bridge Street, and finally at 211 South 2nd Street. She was a member of the Baptist Church in the village. Her picture was taken at a studio by a professional photographer, as was a common practice.
