More Fish House History on the back!!!



Historian's Note:

As the historian of Fish House, I find it fascinating learning about the old houses and the people who lived in them. In 1927, when HRBRRD set the elevation lines, it became clear that Fish House would never be the same. Twelve houses were moved to higher ground and 6 were burned or razed.

Trying to research houses that have been moved is difficult because the deeds deal with the land and not the structures on the land. I am still trying to solve some mysteries of missing houses.

But there are also many old and historical houses in Fish House still standing. One such house stands to the left of the brick church near the corner of 109 & 110. Sadly the house probably will never be brought back to a livable condition. I set out to research this house. On a map of 1860, it stated that an A. Westcot lived there. I surmised that it had to be Alexander St. John Wescot, the grandson of one of the earliest settlers of Fish House, Alexander St. John. History says that Alexander St John had built a house for his grand daughter, Patricia Parnell, so why not for his grandson? My theory was shattered, however, upon learning that Alexander Wescot was born in 1826 and the house was built in 1800. But in doing research on this house I did discover other facts:

- * The house was built in 1800
- * In the 1855 census, Alexander lived in the house and also had boarders, two were from Ireland.
- * It appears that Alexander lived there until his death in 1873.
- * Before Wescot, Maria Tanner owned the house, then Lewis & Malinda Swart.
- * The longest residents were the Vandenberg's. Arthur & Hazel Vandenburg lived there from around the 1930's to 1953. They, too, had boarders in the very large house. They passed ownership not to their son, Robert, and his wife Freda.
