
ECHOES OF FISH HOUSE

Local Doctor Honored

The Detweiler family has lived in Fish House for close to

20 years. Dr. Dean Detweiler works at the Northville Health Center, which is connected with St. Mary's Hospital. This past June he received a national award for excellence. Congratulations,Dr. Dean! We are so very fortunate to have you and your family as our neighbors!

The hamlet of Fish House might be tiny but since it started in 1762, there have been several doctors who have chosen to live here. Some are seasonal residents and some are full time.

Below is an article about the first four doctors that lived and worked in Fish House.

St. Mary's Earns 5-Star Awards

Dr. Samuel Dean Detweiler and the staff of the St. Mary's Northville Health Center were recognized with a 5-Star Excellence in Healthcare award. The ranking is based on Detweiler's patient satisfaction scores that placed him in the 97 percentile of all physicians in PRCs national database.

The hospital's team of doctors, nurses, discharge planners, case managers and other hospital staff earned a 5-Star Excellence in Healthcare award for its exceptional patient satsfaction with the discharge planning process at St. Mary's Hospital. The patient's rating of their discharge process ranked in the top 5 percent nationally in the survey, which has more than 2,500 participating facilities.

Doctors of Fish House from 1823 to 1917

Dr. Alvah Wood was the first known doctor of Fish House. He was born in 1797 and moved to Fish House in 1823. He married Maria Fay and they lived on Main Street (now 109). His house, which also served as his office, was moved up to the corner of Ryder Road and 110. The present owner has been repairing the old building and improving it. Dr. Wood lived in Fish House until his death in 1878.

Dr. Langdon Ithiel Marvin, the son of a Revolutionary soldier, studied medicine under Dr. J.A. Mitchell of Northville. He began his career as a doctor here in Fish House around 1824. His house/office was built by his father, David, on the site of Sir William Johnson's original Fish House, along the Dyke Road. It was moved up onto Cty Hwy 110 in 1929. The house deteriorated to a state where it could not be saved, so it was burned down in 1996. There is an historical marker near that spot. In 1840 he was a Sate Assemblyman in Albany, representing Fulton & Montgomery Counties. At the age of 55, he enlisted for a 3 year term in the 97th Regiment N.Y. Volunteers during the Civil War. Dr. Marvin continued practicing medicine after he returned from the Civil War. He died in 1869 at the age of 64.

Dr. Darius Orton was born in Vermont in 1841. He joined 10th Cavalry in 1861 and during the Civil War he did hospital duty. He finished his medical training at Albany Medical College in 1866. Dr. Orton moved to Fish House in 1869 and started his medical practice in a small brick building that had once been a tailor shop. Around 1900, he moved his family up to the old Grinnell House on Shew Hill. He built a small cottage there for his office. Dr. Orton continued to practice medicine until his death in 1917

Dr. Collis Ingalls was born in 1815 in New Hampshire. He earned his medical degree from Andover Medical College. He moved to Cranberry Creek in the 1840's and "retired" to Fish House in 1866, suffering from what was referred to as consumption. He continued to practice limited medicine until his death in 1872.
